Bear Hunt Game:
After reading the book or singing the song, hide a teddy bear somewhere in the area. Take the group on a walk, whether it's through an activity room or a larger space until you find the bear. Be sure to make obstacles, whether it's blue paper for a river or a small stool for a tree to climb over.

Sniffin' out the Scent:

Activities:

Bears have to use their very good noses for many things! Find various small, lidded containers that can have holes poked in the lids. Place scented objects (orange peels, chocolate, dirt, vinegar, etc) in the containers and pass them around, letting the children guess the smell. With smaller children, have a list of the objects and, as you pass each container, let them vote on what is in each one.

Coffee Scented Bears:

Brush glue onto a bear template and then pour coffee grounds onto it (be sure to do this over a container) and then shake off the extra. Then you have a deliciously scented bear! Here is an example of a possible template: http://www.activityvillage.co.uk/teddy-bear-template.

Teddy Bear Footprint:

Make a child's footprint into an adorable teddy bear! Brush paint onto the sole of the child's foot and have them stamp it onto a piece of construction paper.
