Fingerplays and Action Rhymes:

Extension Activities

Patterns and Sequencing:

Talk about the AAB pattern in the story (swim, swim, sink). Take turns coming up with large motor movements that follow this pattern! (Example: hop hop spin)

Storytelling and Predictions:

When we hear a story, we make predictions on what we think will come next. In this story, the rhymes help us predict what word we think will come next: but stories don't always match our predictions! Tell a story, but after telling a short segment, let another person jump in and continue telling the story. See the path your story takes when you work together to tell it!

STEM Connections: Sink or Float?

Fill a sink or plastic tub with water and gather a variety of objects. Take turns picking an object and making predictions on whether you think it will sink or float. Did you predict correctly? Talk about why you think certain things sink and other things float.

Rhyme Time

It's time to get silly! Make note cards of simple rhyming words, and take turns thinking of words that rhyme, and words that obviously don't rhyme!

Art Time: Rubber Ducks

Gather some rubber ducks and non-toxic paint, and let children paint away however they see fit! They may use the beak, the tail, or the bottom to paint in different colors.



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
